In the days of King Louis, there lived a poor juggler by the name of Barnabas, a native of Compiegne, who wandered from city to city performing tricks of prowess.

In winter time he was no more than a tree stripped of its leaves, in fact, half-dead. The frozen earth was too hard for the juggler. He suffered during the bad season from hunger and cold. But, since he had a simple heart, he suffered in silence.

He had never thought much about the origin of wealth nor about the inequality of human condition. He firmly believed that if this world was evil, the next could not but be good, and this faith upheld him. He was not like the clever fellows who sell their souls to the devil; he never took the name of God in vain, he lived the life of an honest man, and thought he had no wife of his own, he did not covet his neighbour's, for woman is the enemy of strong men, as we learn by the story of Samson, which is written in the Scriptures.
