

Ignacy Jan Paderewski, former Prime Minister of Poland, once performed a piano recital at Stanford University. Two eighteen year old students at the university organized a musical concert on the campus to help raise money for their education. They had been struggling to pay their fees and needed a well-known name to be a part of their concert in order to draw the crowd.

Paderewski's manager demanded a guaranteed fee of two thousand dollars for the piano recital. The boys agreed and worked to make the concert a success.

Unfortunately, they had not managed to sell enough tickets. The total collection was only \$1600. Disappointed, they went to Paderewski and explained their plight.

They gave him the entire \$1600, plus a cheque for the balance. They promised to honour the cheque as soon as they could.

"No," said Paderewski, "this is not acceptable." He tore the cheque, returned the \$1600 and told the two boys, "Here's the \$1600. Keep the money you need for your fees and just give me whatever is left." The boys were surprised and thanked him profusely. It was a small act of kindness. However, it clearly marked out Paderewski as a good human being. Why should he help two people he didn't even know? We all have come across situations like these in our lives. The truly great people think, "If I don't help them, what will happen to them?" Paderewski later went on to become the Prime Minister 50.

Paderewski later went on to become the Prime Minister of Poland. He was a great leader. Unfortunately, when World War II began, Poland was shattered. There were more than 1.5 million people starving in his country, and there was no money to feed them. The war had left Poland in ruins. Paderewski did not know where to turn to for help. He reached out to the US Food and Relief Administration for help. The chief administrator was a man called Herbert Hoover, who later went on to become the President of the United States.
